His Military Experience

- Get the basics on when and where he served
- Since you have experienced real war, has this changed your views on tactical battles?
- How does a tactical battle compare to a real battle?
- Why do you think there is such an emphasis in reenactment communities on reenacting wars? We have read many arguments saying people participate in these battles for the thrill of warfare they will never actually experience.
- Is war romanticized in reenactment communities?
- Why do you, personally reenact warfare? (It cannot be to experience something
 - o you've never experienced...You have experienced real war, and If you know war is a
 - o horrible thing, why reenact it?)

 - o Is it difficult to transition between the past and present?
- Is the past dead?
- Do you wish you were in the past? Prefer it to the present?

- Is the past at risk of being forgotten if you don't reenact it? Are you really keeping it alive?
- What is the importance of so forcefully keeping the past it in the present like this? What can it teach us?

Authenticity

- Could you define "farb" for us?
- Can you explain how you aim to achieve authenticity? And why?
 - o Magic moments?
 - It's more than just wearing the clothes? Does something have to happen mentally?
- Limits to authenticity? Compromises you have to make (funding, practicality)
- If complete authenticity is impossible, why bother?
- Do you feel a responsibility to portray history with exact accuracy? If you make small changes, do you worry you are in some way "corrupting the past"?
 - (Heather -- accuracy is a way of respecting the past. Inaccurate impressions disrespect? Does respect factor in?)
- Do you find yourself romanticizing the past in your reenactments? Do you focus on the things you find attractive about it? Is there misery (is it still sort of fun though?)
- History is more than war, so why only reenact war? Is the reenactment community's focus on war, in a way, inauthentic (or is it not your mission to accurately represent ALL of history)
