- Is nostalgia or escapism the driving force behind this hobby?

Authenticity Questions:

- Please explain the terms reenactors use to refer to different levels of authenticity
- What are some ways you try to achieve authenticity? What's the difference between simply wearing the clothes and really embodying a character?
- Do you believe the past can be exactly replicated through this hobby? If not, why do you put so much effort into getting so close?
- Is it acceptable to reenact a period you don't know much about? Even if you do something that is not true to the period while reenacting?
- How have you strived to make your impressions authentic?
- What compromises do you have to make in accuracy? (ie. What are the limitations/frustrations)
 - If we can't exactly recreate the past, why do we keep trying?

Choice of Impressions:

- Why do you do so many different impressions instead of focusing in on one?
- We have interviewed a living history interpreter at Claude Moore whose whole goal is to recreate "everyday life" and to represent the common man. Why do you choose underrepresented people?
- Can you see yourself in the people you reenact? Even when you are not reenacting Americans? Does this allow you to adopt multiple identities?
- Why do you think some periods are reenacted and others ignored?
- Do escapism or nostalgia play a role here?
